Chaplain's Message January 2022

With the Christmas season behind us, we now look forward with anticipation to the new year. We hope and pray that 2022, will see positive changes to our world, while also giving us some healthy life choices and renewed freedom. As our individual communities attempt to move forward, collectively we hope for new occasions to encourage and look out for each other. Not only does the RCMP vets association afford us this caring opportunity, our outreach into the community also gives us moments to selflessly impact humans. Message to all Veterans

Our Advocate Dave Leblanc advised that some Veterans (that are entitled to medications due to disability) on VAC Pensions qualify for a Covid \$200 supply of masks, gloves, and hand sanitizers. I went to our local Pharmacy with my Veterans Affairs 7-digit K # requesting the Covid entitlement package and they contacted Veterans Affairs and called me back the following day advising that for my condition I did qualify, and they are in the process of making a package of supplies for me to pick up at the store. Note they asked me what I wanted in the package, and I advised masks, hand sanitizers followed by gloves. Everyone can choose their needs. Some Pharmacyies have you pay and submit your receipt to VAC and others submit direct for payment.
