November we hold our Annual General Meeting (AGM) during Each year in our regular Dinner meeting which is a requirement of the Association. Prior to the meeting we were honoured to have Shawn Whitfield and Bob Cotton from the Edmonton Veterans Association Food Bank. We learned very quickly they are NOT merely a Food Bank. They are

there for Veteran Assistance with staff on call 24 hours a day, 7 days a week providing the following services:

- **EMERGENCY VETERANS ASSISTANCE COSTS:** They provide funding for any financial crises a Veteran may be experiencing by covering rent, mortgage, utilities, insurance, car payments, dental and medications all coupled with financial services and a financial planner to alleviate future difficulties,
- **VETERAN OUTREACH:** They work with Police, Fire, EMS, AHS and shelters to connect with Veterans who are at risk or homeless. With the help of other organizations, they have housed at risk Veterans in hotels or their rooming house until suitable housing and employment can be found,
- ❖ VETERAN ADVOCACY SERVICES: They help set up Veterans with VAC accounts, filing medical claims, screening for Operational Stress Injuries (OSI),
 - connecting Veterans with other Government Assistance Programs such as AISH, Alberta's Works Senior Benefits Programs and more and are on call 24 hours a day,
- ❖ THEIR THRIFT STORE: The main purpose is to create employment for Veterans who struggled to seek employment in the past. They also help provide furniture, household goods, clothes for Vets transitioning from homelessness or a break down in the family unit,

WILLS AND ESTATE PLANNING: They have recognized most of the Veteran community have never drawn up a will. They also cover burial costs if required,

- TAXES: They have realized many Vets have not filed their taxes for many years and by not doing this, the Vet may not be eligible for Social Assistance, AISH, etc.,
- ❖ PET PROMISE PROGRAM: This program was implemented in 2020 when they learned many Veterans could not afford the required care for their pets. The Association has recognized the importance pets play in the well being of the Veterans they serve.



From the CO Alberta Highlights – December

Last month was an important time of remembrance in our country and for the Alberta RCMP with Remembrance Day and Indigenous Veterans Day. It is always an honour to be able to give special acknowledgment to all who have served and sacrificed for our collective freedom. This

month I will touch on some of our activities and current important topics to share with you. Through all the challenges of recent years, there are still moments that remind us why we do what we do. What our employees and members do every day to contribute to the safety and well-being of our communities, and what you as Veterans have already done for so many years, makes me proud.

Update on Alberta Police Service



Newly appointed Premier Danielle Smith has now been in her seat for just over a month and she has issued mandate letters to many of her ministers, including Minister Tyler Shandro, the Minister of Justice, and Minister Mike Ellis, Minister of Public Safety and Emergency Services. Within the letters, there is direction to move forward with establishing an Alberta Provincial Police Service.

This is exactly what Premier Smith has said she would move to do since assuming her role as the leader of the province. The letters seem to

formalize her direction to pursue an Alberta police service that would augment mental health and addictions crisis response resources.

The mandate letters that were recently issued by Premier Danielle Smith were to formalize the government's direction to pursue an Alberta police service to augment mental health and addictions crisis response resources.

The scope of the role of the Alberta RCMP in this decision has not yet been determined and the government has not yet expanded or shared how provincial policing might be augmented or affected throughout the upcoming months.

What I would like to focus on is how important it is at this time to continue to recognize the importance and value of the Alberta RCMP in this province. We have relationships and history with our communities and citizens that we continue to foster and grow. I can assure you that the commitment, professionalism, history of service, and invaluable hard work of Alberta RCMP employees, both past and present, is enduring and has a deep impact within our communities. We are fiercely proud to serve this province and be a part of the RCMP.

Regardless of any stages or steps that are yet to come, we will continue to work closely with citizens, community leaders and community stakeholders in maintaining our commitment to the safety and security of Albertans. We have the support of the communities we serve across

Alberta, and we acknowledge and support the importance of Albertans having a voice and having an active role in policing in the province.

I am proud of the work of each employee to contribute to the success of the whole organization. I am confident in the police service we provide for all Albertans, and I am grateful for the commitment, professionalism, and resiliency of everyone in the organization, including our Veterans.

Celebrating the RCMP 150th birthday in 2023

In 2023, the RCMP will be celebrating a milestone 150th birthday on May 23. The Alberta Regimental Pipe, Drums & Dancers band attended competition in Uruguay

I am proud to share that in late October the Alberta Regimental Pipe, Drums & Dancers band attended and competed at the Scottish Pipe Band Association of South America's (SPBASA) 9th Gathering (G9) in Montevideo, Uruguay.

The Alberta Regimental Pipe, Drums & Dancers band was formed in Edmonton in the early 1990s and is comprised of civilian, military and RCMP volunteer members, led by Pipe Major Mike Johnson and Drum Major Jared Redekopp. Over the course of the band's 29-year history, they have performed throughout Alberta and Canada and have also performed in the United States and Europe, including attending the 100th Anniversary of the Battle of Vimy Ridge.



This was the first time a pipe band from outside South America has attended the event and there were 15 musicians and four dancers travelling to the Uruguayan competition. Over the course of six days, they competed in three events, participating in a massed band parade, conducted clinics and performed in support of the Embassy of Canada to Uruguay.

All costs for the trip were fundraised by the band through a variety of events including their annual Robbie Burns dinner, silent auctions as well as honorariums from performances.

Barry Callbeck, Secretary:

- Moved the minutes from October 20/2022 Executive Meeting be adopted as published.

- Updated the Executive on discussions with the Provincial Chief Firearms Officer (CPFO). He is presently looking into the rifle's origins and is confident it will be classified as an antique.

Kees Kikkert, President:

- With the Remembrance Day ceremony at the University Butter Dome cancelled, Kees asked about how Exec members observed Remembrance Day. Unfortunately, the presence of the Veterans at some detachments was disappointing as there seemed to be little knowledge of RCMP Veterans' and the significance of their attendance. It would seem there is insufficient direction to Detachments in recognizing our attendance and that it should be inclusive and respectful.
- Kees brought to the table the need for a new computer for Randy Montgomery, our Communications Director. Randy is presently trying to use an old computer previously used by Linda and it is just not meeting his needs. Kees has researched the cost of a replacement and found one on sale.

Kees on behalf of Dianne Lehman, Director, Support Advocate:

• Verification Services, Vets Canada - How to verify service within the RCMP:

Dianne recently met with Edmonton Vets Canada (VC) (https://vetscanada.org) staff to gather information and develop a networking relationship. VC offer crisis and emergency transition services to military and RCMP veterans who are in desperate need of assistance. They are funded by federal and provincial governments and are a registered service provider with Veteran Affairs Canada.

The local VC office requires a streamlined method to verify an RCMP member's service, to offer them services in a timely manner. Prospective clients often present themselves to their office with no proof of service, for various reasons. Validation of service information cannot be made through

Veteran Affairs. Potential clients are asked to provide their Date of Birth, Regimental Number and Dates of Service in the RCMP. Once a member, retired or otherwise, is a client of Vets Canada, VC may become their Veteran Affair advocate with a signed consent form.

Dianne approached S/M Leilani Collins with the above. Leilani consulted with some important national partners who all agreed one point of contact for such inquiries would be beneficial for everyone as this will offer consistency and assist in providing timely assistance in the confirmation process. Nationally, the team who works on the Veterans Record of Service Card has agreed to assist in this important verification process. As such please guide your contacts at the Veterans Canada to send the request to RCMP.DigitalSignature-SignatureNumerique.GRC@rcmp-grc.gc.ca In order to provide confirmation, they will require the following:
