Coronation of HRH King Charles III



As the Gold State Coach made its way from Buckingham Palace to Westminster Abbey to pick up the newly crowned King Charles and Queen Camilla, five members of the RCMP's Musical Ride led the way.

The Mounties, riding horses the force had given the Royal Family over the years, also led the elaborate coach on its way back to Buckingham Palace after the coronation on

May 6, 2023.

"All five horses were just absolutely magnificent. I couldn't have been happier," Sgt. Maj. Scott Williamson, the RCMP's riding master, said in an interview.

One horse, however, was under particular scrutiny. Noble, a seven-year-old mare given by the RCMP to the King a few weeks ago, was making her debut in a major ceremonial event, complete with all of its surrounding noises and distractions and crowds.

"Noble was the one that we were mainly focused on and I guess you could say concerned with because this was going to be her first time," Williamson said.

Any concerns about the horse that had been chosen for the King because of her calm disposition, among other qualities, were allayed as Noble steadily progressed along the route with George, Elizabeth, Sir John and Darby.

"She was absolutely tremendous," said Williamson. "It was like she had done it 100 times." In the end, the crowds didn't bother the horses at all.

"We expected the crowds to be quite loud," said Williamson, "and what we didn't want is for any sharp noises to potentially bother the horses, so we actually

plugged their ears to soften and muffle any of the sound."

Williamson, who had ridden with other Mounties in the procession after the Queen's funeral last September, wasn't riding this time.

"Once we got the horses in the place where they were going to be for the procession, I stepped aside and I was actually right to the side of the abbey as His Majesty and Her Majesty exited," Williamson said. "And then they went by me in the carriage, so I got an opportunity to give them a good salute and they made eye contact with me and it was quite a special moment, actually."

For Williamson, it was an honour and "incredibly humbling" to be involved in the RCMP's role leading the sovereign's escort.

But more so, he said, there was a feeling that they were representing all of Canada.

"That's really what means the most to me, and ... I said quite often actually when we were there [that] I hope that the Canadians who didn't get to do what we did, who didn't get to participate in that event, I hope they got to feel a sense of pride that we felt."

Williamson said it was also a really special moment for the RCMP, particularly as he looks back on the relationship the RCMP had with Charles's mother.

"I can't help but think of the very first horse that we gifted the Queen," he said, referencing Burmese, given to Elizabeth in 1969 and which she rode at Trooping the Colour, marking her official birthday, for 18 years.

"It was an all-black mare born and bred in the province of Saskatchewan and then now ... the very first horse that we give the King is an all-black mare named [by] a young child from Estevan, Saskatchewan," said Williamson.

To Williamson, it seems to be a "full circle moment."

"It was really proud to be a piece of that history, even if it was just a small piece."



RCMP Regimental Ball

RCMP salute wives with Second Man Award



This is reprinted from the Tuesday November 5th, 2013, Mississauga News edition written by reporter, Joseph Chin.

In the old days, RCMP officers working in small and isolated communities often had little in the way of backup.

When there was no one else to turn to, the officers turned to their wives. The women monitored the portable radio, answered phones, cooked, typed reports and filed paperwork.

"It was always an adventure, a very different way of life," recalled Streetsville resident Dusanka Bilic-Wood, who last Friday was presented with the RCMP's Second Man Award, created by the force in 2010 to honour these unsung heroes.

In April 1979, Bilic-Wood followed her fiancé, Gary Wood, then a rookie RCMP officer, from Montreal to his posting in Newfoundland. They married two years later, and for the next nine years would live in Roddickton, Corner Brook and Happy Valley-Goose Bay, wherever Wood was stationed.

Goose Bay detachment was the only posting to have a so-called "Patrol Cabin" and Bilic-Wood was her husband's "back-up."

Prostate Cancer Awareness



Did you know that September is Prostate Cancer Awareness Month?

Did you know that the statistics in Canada for breast cancer and prostate cancer are very similar? You wouldn't know it based on all the articles, publicity, and wide knowledge about the risks of breast cancer compared to what is said about prostate cancer.

That's because men don't want to talk about prostate cancer. Most don't know what the prostate does or where it is – except that it is "down there" somewhere, so best not to talk about it and it is too embarrassing to go to the doctor about.

The reality is that prostate cancer is the most common non-skin cancer in men and becomes more prevalent as we grow older. The reality is that the majority of prostate cancer is slow growing and has no early symptoms but can be eradicated in 95% of cases if caught early.

So why not educate yourself? Understand that the PSA test is a simple blood test and a potential indicator and valuable tracking mechanism to monitor changes happening in your prostate (which may or may not be cancer). Talk to your doctor about

when the PSA test might be appropriate for you. Many experts suggest getting a 'baseline' PSA result at age 50. Know that your risk is greater if you have a family history of prostate, breast, or ovarian cancer, or if you are African Canadian or Caribbean-Canadian.

All prostate cancer treatments have side-effects and, because of the location of the prostate in the body, there are potential issues with incontinence and/or erectile difficulties. This a challenge for most men. So, the knee-jerk reaction of "just get it out of me" when faced with a prostate cancer diagnosis is often not the wise move even though it is an understandable reaction.

A prostate cancer diagnosis is not a death sentence. Not all prostate cancer is the same but, in the majority of cases, it is a slow-growing disease which gives men time to make an informed decision. If you start with an understanding of the disease and your options, you will not be pressured by the immediacy of the situation. Take the time to do some reading, talk to your doctor or consult with men in the prostate cancer community who are always happy to help. Remember, you are not alone.

Over the last decade or more, the concept of Active Surveillance has gained ground in North America as the best approach for low-grade, slow-growing prostate cancer. Regular monitoring via the PSA test and scans such as MRI can allow a man to avoid the side-effects of treatment while postponing or even eliminating the need for invasive treatment. However, this route is only open to those men who are willing to get tested in the first place and who know to ask the right questions of their doctors.

So please don't ignore your prostate. Know that prostate cancer is a risk as you age but it is a disease that can be cured or controlled. Don't bury your head in the sand. Ladies, take your man by the scruff of his neck (or somewhere else that gets his attention) and get him to do the right thing. Ask your doctor about testing and be persistent if you think this is the right thing for you to do.




- 1. Though less common than earthquakes, the moon actually has moonquakes, too. That's right. Moonquakes.
